# **English Sparkling Wine makes history**

# First wine outside Champagne crowned Champion Sparkling Wine as International Wine Challenge 2025 awards are announced

10<sup>th</sup> September 2025 – The global wine industry raised a glass to England last night as the International Wine Challenge, the world's most influential and rigorously judged wine competition, unveiled the results of its highly anticipated 2025 Awards. But the biggest surprise of the night came from England, who toppled Champagne and Australia to seize the crown for both Champion Sparkling Wine and Champion Sparkling Winemaker.

#### **English Sparkling Wines steal the show**

England dominated the Champion Wines and Winemakers awards, with renowned Sussex producer Nyetimber taking centre stage. In a dramatic twist, its Nyetimber Blanc de Blancs Magnum 2016 was crowned **Champion Sparkling Wine (Daniel Thibault Trophy)**, the first time the award has gone to a wine outside of Champagne. Nyetimber's Head Winemaker, Cherie Spriggs, was also named as **Sparkling Winemaker of the Year**, making it a double triumph for an English winery that is fast becoming one of the world's most celebrated producers. Spriggs has won the trophy before in 2018, but she is still the only woman to have done so and the only person outside France to have won twice.

Spriggs, who has been at Nyetimber since 2007 after discovering it when her parents gifted her a bottle in 2001, commented, 'It means so much to me to have received these two trophies from a premier and globally renowned wine competition. Everything we do at Nyetimber is in pursuit of

quality, and awards such as these give well-earned recognition for the tireless efforts of everyone at Nyetimber.

We are thrilled to be recognised as the best sparkling wine in the world with the Champion Sparkling Wine trophy for our Blanc de Blancs 2016 Magnum. Blanc de Blancs is a very special wine for us, as it was the first wine to have ever been created at Nyetimber – so this feels like a very significant 'first' for English sparkling wine. Winning both of these trophies really brings to life the pioneering vision of Eric Heerema and the belief that I share with him that England really is the best place in the world to be making traditional method sparkling wines.'

England's winning streak continued with the trophy for **Best Wine in First Year of Production** awarded to the Seyval Blanc, Brut 2017 from Kingsthorne in Gloucestershire. This new name in wine not only secured the English Seyval Sparkling Trophy earlier in the year but also achieved the extraordinary feat of outperforming wines in their first year of production from every other country in the competition.

# **International Wine Challenge UK Industry Awards**

There was plenty of cause for celebration, with UK businesses of all sizes recognised in the prestigious Industry Awards, which were presented to 36 wine and retail companies nationwide to recognise the dedication and creativity of those who help share the joy of wine with consumers across the UK.

In the supermarket category, Tesco impressed with three Industry Awards, the most Industry Awards won by a single company this year, taking home **Own Label Range of the Year**, **Supermarket of the Year** and **Buying Team of the Year**.

The **Great Value Champion Wines** are one of the most anticipated awards at the International Wine Challenge as they shine a spotlight on the supermarkets delivering unbeatable quality at everyday prices. With all wines costing under £15 (or £25 for sparkling), these awards help consumers cut through the shelves of choice to find bottles that truly over-deliver. This year's winners, Tesco, ASDA, Sainsbury's, and M&S proved they know how to bring exceptional wine to shoppers without breaking the bank, earning them the coveted **Great Value Champion Awards** (see below).

Continuing in the retail sector, Majestic took home the award for Large Multiple Retailer of the Year, having also won Rosé Specialist of the Year and The Wine Society was awarded Online Retailer of the Year, also taking home Sustainable Retailer of the Year.

The **Restaurant Wine List of the Year** went to Corkage, an independent wine restaurant in Bath celebrated for its extensive wine list including skin contact and orange wines all categorised by wine style, with wines not only offered by the glass and bottle but also by Coravin.

The International Wine Challenge assesses every wine 'blind' in two rounds in London over a two-week period with every decision scrutinised by the co-chairs: Tim Atkin MW, Sam Caporn MW, Oz Clarke, Dr Jamie Goode, Peter McCombie MW and Helen McGinn. Each wine is judged for its faithfulness to style, region and vintage. Awards include medals (Gold, Silver, Bronze) and Commended, and Trophies are awarded to the very best wines in each category. The International Wine Challenge is committed to helping consumers discover great wine, and the medals displayed on winning bottles offer a trusted guarantee of quality.
